Who do you count as a family member?

Webster's has eight definitions of family:

1: the basic unit in society traditionally consisting of two parents rearing their children,

Council Update

- Council met on 2/15/2023 at 6pm via Zoom.
- Council granted Pastor Jennifer's request for vacation for 3/12/23 and some days before and after that date.
- YTD Budget Income is \$538.19 less than YTD Budget Expense.
- From April on regular council meetings will be the 2nd Wednesday, 6pm via Zoom
- Date for council installation: 3/5/23
 - Annual Meeting Recap:
 - An excellent job was done, considering this was our first hybrid annual meeting.
 - A wireless microphone might allow the Zoom participants to hear the in-person participants.
 - Members need to be reminded to study the Annual Report prior to the meeting. A few extra copies, especially of the budget, should be available at the meeting.
 - Prior to the meeting congregation members should be encouraged to hand any motion they want to be tabled at the Annual Meeting to any council member.
- Parochial report: Caren provided a short explanation of the nature and importance of the report and requested council input on some items.
- Continuing resolutions: Caren provided a short explanation of the nature or the document, and the plan for council to enact the resolutions, to present the document to the congregation at the next Annual Meeting.
- Items on the "Annual Events" page: We need to draft an Emergency Plan and include it in our Continuing Resolutions. Synod has asked about it in previous parochial reports.
- Annual trainings: Sexual Harassment Prevention training needs to be done annually by staff and council members. Child Protection Training needs to be done when we have again Prime Time with God or youth work.
- Council approved the project of Phyllis Groeger and Coral Reed to provide Easter baskets to the VA in Emanuel's name.
- Outreach: Brenda reported that Habitat for Humanity is restoring a house in our neighborhood. Congregation members interested in Outreach have responded to indicate their interest in the project. Brenda is liaising with the Community Outreach Director Steuben Co Habitat for Humanity to arrange for a day of service.
- **RIC Exploration:** Brenda reports that she is determining the best way to move forward with the process of becoming a RIC congregation and hopes that the congregation will vote on it at the next annual meeting. She would like to make sure we have educational opportunities and the chance for meaningful dialog throughout the process.
- IT: Brenda and Caren are in the process of loading various documents, e.g. council minutes, the constitution, member lists and bulletins, onto the council's Google Drive.
- WELCA: 266 quarts of soup were made 1/30-2/2/23. Thrivent provided \$500 to help with the expenses. The profit of \$1482.76 goes to the kitchen fund.
- Worship and Music Team: At the meeting on 2/12 arrangements for Lent were discussed. Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday will be at 5pm this year. The Sunday after Easter will be Holy Humor Sunday.

What the Lenten Season Means to Me

As I look back through the years I find it surprising that I can't recall much mention of Lent in our family. Oh, I knew it was a time to give up something that might not be good for me or a habit, but that just meant another New Year's resolution that I ignored anyway.

My own personal journey down the Lenten road began next door with the Roman Catholic family that lived there. Their two boys went to the parochial school. One day when I was about 12 or 13 they came home from school with ashes on their foreheads in the shape of a cross. I had never seen or heard about this before. When I asked them what the ashes were for they said it was something done every year on Ash Wednesday. Other than that they were unaware of any real religious meaning to it. Like me, they were just starting to grow into the Lenten season.

The three of us were sitting on their porch when their father came out. I asked him what the ashes meant. He laughed at first and asked me if his boys hadn't explained it. With my "No" reply he got serious. He told me – and his boys – that the ashes symbolized penance and mourning throughout that day to publicly express their Catholic faith and repentance as well as open the door to the coming season.


I was intrigued by this – or as intrigued as someone my age could be. I brought the matter up at supper that evening. Dad, being a former Catholic, knew a little about it. Mom, on the other hand, said it was just a Catholic tradition.

That's how things stood for me until I began taking catechism classes that fall. Our pastor told us pretty much what our neighbor had said. He said it was a good thing for everybody to begin to know what Lent was about. That took me to this road to the cross, crucifixion and Resurrection. I look at that road as one that narrows as we approach Good Friday, ending at the cross. You can't get to the joys of Easter without facing the cross. And you can't get to the cross without understanding the implications of it.

The season of Lent has been on a learning curve for me. Each year I try to learn something new about it. I have finally begun to "get it." I say "begun" because the road is never-ending. The joys of Christmas and our Savior's birth give way to sadness as we begin to understand why he came among us and what he willingly endured for us, God's people.

Instead of hardening myself to just take a path around the sadness of Good Friday and get to Easter, I find I'm swept up with emotion as my understanding gets deeper. This is a road we Christians must take. Lent isn't about giving something up, rather being repentant and giving yourself to God.

Joy Overacker, Community Outreach Director Steuben County Habitat for Humanity The Reconciling in Christ (RIC) program is a program through the Reconciling Works organization, which recognizes congregations and Lutheran organizations that declare themselves welcoming to all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

Part of being recognized as an RIC congregation, includes a Welcome Statement written and agreed upon by Emanuel Lutheran Church members and voted upon. Though this statement needs to include welcoming LGBTQIA+ people, it can include much more than that—people of all ages, races, physical and mental abilities, etc. This statement would probably confirm what we already believe - Emanuel is a church centered in Christ, a community where all are beloved.

Part of the journey to decide whether this designation is something Emanuel wants includes -

- preparing a Welcome Statement that is right for us.
- Offering opportunities for conversation, education, and scriptural engagement.

Throughout 2023, we plan to offer all these opportunities. If you would like to help guide this journey and answer the question - what does "welcome" mean and would the designation help people who visit our church feel genuinely welcomed and that our church feels "like home" as many of us already do, please share your interest with Brenda Passmore or one of the other members of the team.




