2 He began to teach them many things in parables, and in his teaching he said to them: 3 "Listen! A sower went out to sow. 4 And as he sowed, some seed fell on a path, and the birds came and ate it up. 5 Other seed fell on rocky ground, where it did not have much soil, and it sprang up quickly, since it had no depth of soil. 6 And when the sun rose, it was scorched, and since it had no root it withered away. 7 Other seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it, and it yielded no grain. 8 Other seed fell into good soil and brought forth grain, growing up and increasing and yielding thirty and sixty and a hundredfold." 9 And he said, "If you have ears to hear, then hear!" ~~Mark 4:2-9

When I spend time with the parable of the sower, I often wonder: what is it I need to 'have ears to hear'?

I have known times in my life that have been like each of the seeds Jesus speaks of: times without depth, times when things heated up, and thorny times. Perhaps part of 'hearing' is observing what life around me looks like, and where I might know God's presence in the midst of it.

I have also known times of good soil... of growth and hope and promise, and God's presence has been in the midst of that as well. There are many who, like the sower in the story, have attended to my faith of the course of time, asked important questions, offered their thoughts and companionship on the journey. It reminds that the journey of faith is not one taken alone, but surrounded by the community of faith.

Perhaps having 'ears to hear' is simply the work of listening for God... in all times and places. How would you think about it?

Speaking of 'hearing,' here are some things that are coming up in worship!


Reformation Sunday is celebrated the last Sunday of October... don't forget to wear red!

I have decided to tie this month's article to my sermon on October 1. If you missed it; go on Facebook to see what I had to offer.

I am going to focus on a couple of women who helped preserve the "Root of Jessie" by helping save David and his descendants.

David's wife, Michal, saved him from her father, Saul. We all know that Saul spent a lot of time trying to have David killed. One of these times, Michal let David down through a window. She then delayed the search by making a fake, sleeping "David" using pillows, goat hair and clothing. This allowed the real David time to escape.

A few generations later:

King Joram (king of Israel) and King Ahaziah (king of Judah) were both killed by Jehu. Ahaziah's mother, Athaliah, desired to become ruler. She devised a plan to kill all the heirs to the throne. Jehosheba, daughter of King Joram and sister of King Ahaziah, learned of the plan. She hid the infant Joash and his nurse while the other sons of Ahaziah were being killed. She kept him hidden in the house of God for six years. During the seventh year Joash was declared the rightful king and Athaliah was put to death. Joash (also known as Jehoash) ruled for forty years.

These are two examples of daring deeds, which could be punished with death, that God used to preserve the promise of keeping David's line on the throne.

Emanuel Lutheran Church Council Update

- Council met 9/13/23 via Zoom.
- Pastor Jennifer and Sharon attended the 50 year celebration of the Corning Food Pantry.
- Pastor Jennifer will have time off 10/1, the weeks of 11/12-19, and 12/12-14 (Tuesday -Thursday).
- Current YTD Budgeted Expenses are \$1,650.54 more than YTD Budgeted Income.
- Administrative Assistant: At the end of August Janette resigned for the end of September and Brenda has offered to fill her position. Sharon thanked Janette for her service. After a time for questions and discussions council members voted online in favor of hiring Brenda. Brenda stated that she will perform her paid work in the office and not at home. She doesn't want to be asked about work when at worship. She will be strict about deadlines.
- Air purifiers: Sharon reports that each of the 4 air purifiers have 2 filters which need to be replaced every 6 months at a cost of \$265 per purifier. Sharon will do further research, to prepare for a discussion if the equipment should be used again in the winter.
- AED: At a meeting on 8/15 monthly checks were agreed upon.
- Property: During the summer extensive work was done on the church grounds. The church sign was sanded and refinished, and a new protective tin roof was added. It needs new plexiglass. Corning Natural Gas replaced the gas line, and still needs to complete fixing the parking lot and FH lawn. Numerous routine inspections took place. Church entrance doors were lightly sanded and stained. There is a list of 15 proposed projects.
- Outreach: 3 members volunteered for Habitat for Humanity on 9/9, and on 9/10 the congregation assisted with setting up for the WELCA rummage sale, as part of 'God's work our Hands' celebration.
- RIC: Brenda is encouraging everybody strongly to attend the event on 10/15. We will
 discuss at the next RIC meeting if and how to set up Zoom participation. Caren replies
 that nobody attended the opportunity to ask questions on 9/12.






